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Improving Outcomes by Addressing Barriers

Susanne B. Wilson Women and Children's Center Delivers Comprehensive Care

Located on the Santa Clara Valley Medical Center campus, Susanne B. Wilson Women and Children's Center provides comprehensive care all under one roof — including a Mother and Baby Unit, Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU), and Pediatric Intensive Care Unit (PICU). It is named in honor of former Santa Clara County Supervisor Susie Wilson, a trailblazer leader and champion of healthcare for all.

Thanks to the generosity of donors, Valley Health Foundation has supported efforts to ensure the Women and Children's Center is a welcoming space for the families and children it serves.

Most recently, this includes a new library and outdoor patio that is open to patients and families during their inpatient stay. The library space provides a variety of books for youth of all ages that patients can enjoy. The colorful spaces mirror other art installations and spaces in the Women and Children's Center (including the "Like a Multivitamin" installation in its courtyard).



The Women and Children's Center also unveiled a new art installation named "Sentia" in 2023. Created by German artist Christian Moeller, the 30-foot-tall kinetic sculpture is inspired by wildlife, such as the drinking bird or stork.

Greeting patients from the roof, Sentia is a welcoming centerpiece for patients, especially children, as they arrive at the Women and Children's Center.

Fleet of New Ambulances Assist with Transport

Santa Clara Valley Healthcare (SCVH) has rolled out a welcome new ambulance fleet to help make sure everyone gets the emergency care they need, right when they need it. Last May, SCVH introduced these ambulances to cut down on patient transport times across the public healthcare system. This means quicker transfers between the three public hospitals and other facilities like clinics, Behavioral Health, Custody Health Services, and more.

Valley Health Foundation (VHF) was excited to team up with SCVH to get these ambulances on the road. Thanks to fundraising efforts led by Friends of St. Louise, part of Valley Health Foundation, this initiative is now a reality.

These new ambulances are transforming for patient care, ensuring timely and appropriate levels of treatment. Not only do they enhance the patient experience and reduce wait times, but they also improve hospital bed efficiencies. For example, getting ICU patients ready for step-down care to their next destination faster means precious ICU beds can be available for new patients sooner.

The fleet includes twelve ambulances: nine for basic transfers that have been in service since May, one for advanced life support, one for critical care transport, and a NICU transport unit.

The NICU transport unit is specially designed to move babies in need of specialized care to SCVMC's Level IV NICU. This vehicle allows the NICU team to start providing care as soon as the baby is on board. This new unit, replacing an older vehicle, was designed with input from NICU staff to ensure an embracing and comforting environment for families during such a stressful time.



One Little Book Helps Develop Early Literacy

Reach Out and Read Integrates Books with Pediatric Care

We help champion the powerful bond between books and children, much like the classic pairing of milk and cookies – only far healthier and essential for child development. To further this mission, VHF has joined forces with Reach Out and Read, an initiative through which an astounding 41,470 books have been distributed across seven Santa Clara County clinics over the past two years.

Reach Out and Read is a national nonprofit dedicated to fostering early literacy and school readiness in young children by integrating books into pediatric care. VHF plays a crucial role by staffing and coordinating the program's activities at seven clinics via Santa Clara Valley Healthcare. VHF is celebrating its 15th year of participating in this important program. The program provides books in English, Spanish, Vietnamese, and Chinese, which are given to children during routine pediatric visits.

Dr. Amy Kostishack shares, "One of my favorite parts of a checkup is introducing a new book to a patient. Through the Reach Out and Read program, primary care pediatricians have the opportunity to share age-appropriate books with infants and children, especially those who may not have many books at home. Opening the first page of a book at the start of a visit helps break the ice and ease any nervousness."

These multicultural books reflect the diverse backgrounds of our patient population and convey important messages about family, emotions, healthy eating, and enjoyable activities. Many of the books are crafted to be fun and captivating, encouraging children to read them repeatedly.

Approximately one-third of U.S. children start kindergarten without the skills needed to succeed in school. This program introduces the joy of reading to families from all backgrounds and economic means, making it a part of their daily routines. Early reading offers numerous benefits, including strengthening parent-child bonds, expanding vocabulary and listening skills, and enhancing sound and letter recognition.

Pioneering Clinical Research

VHF supports valuable research for SCVH by providing financial, logistical and administrative assistance, allowing researchers to focus on what's important – innovative and meaningful patient outcomes.

Asterias Stem Cell Study

At Santa Clara Valley Medical Center, physicians conducted a clinical trial where they injected stem cells into the spinal cords of patients with severe spinal cord injuries. The goal of this trial was to investigate whether stem cells could be safely used to help regenerate damaged neural connections and potentially restore some level of neurological function. Participants were evaluated for neurological improvements for one-year post-injection. The safety follow-up will continue for 15 years.

"The future for stem cell research is bright," said Stephen McKenna, MD, of the Rehabilitation Trauma Center at SCVMC. "Conducting the world's first clinical trial of human embryonic stem cells and showing that they have been safe is a historic milestone in this new and developing field."

Spinal Cord Injury Model Systems

The Spinal Cord Injury Model Systems (SCIMS) program is a network of specialized programs across the United States that improve the longterm outcomes for individuals with spinal cord injuries (SCI). Santa Clara Valley Medical Center is one of 18 SCIMS centers in the United States. SCIMS also maintains a national database to collect and analyze data on SCI, which helps inform future research and treatment strategies.

SCVMC has been collecting data for over 45 years, including valuable follow-up assessments that shed light on aging with a spinal cord injury, community integration, and quality of life.



Multimodal Module Monitoring for Infants

Very premature or critically ill infants face significant risks for brain injury and abnormal brain development, which can lead to longterm neurodevelopmental disabilities and mental health disorders. Early detection allows healthcare providers to identify brain injuries quickly and administer preventive and therapeutic interventions to protect the brain.

The SCVMC NICU has established a non-invasive multimodal monitoring system. This system captures, displays, and stores various synchronized vital signs and neurological parameters. The results from this study will help develop strategies for the prevention, early detection, and treatment of neonatal brain injury.

Maternal Breast Milk Intake for Premature Infants

Recent studies show that premature babies who receive mother's breast milk tend to have better brain development. This study aims to look at the type of milk (mom's milk, donor milk, or formula) and the amount of milk premature babies (born before 33 weeks) receive in the NICU until they are about 37 weeks old. The goal is to figure out how different diets affect their health both in the short term and long term. This research could help improve the care of these tiny infants by highlighting the benefits of feeding them maternal milk.



Innovation with Focus on Exceptional Outcomes

Decision Aid for Burn Reconstructive Surgery

The Burn Center at Santa Clara Valley Medical Center is dedicated to helping burn survivors regain their quality of life. Work is in progress on a leading-edge decision aid to assist surgeons in making the best choices for reconstructive burn surgery. This high-fidelity tool aims to make a big difference for those affected by burns and to advance the entire field of plastic surgery. Addressing the functional and emotional challenges of burn scars is one of the most pressing needs in plastic surgery, and the Burn Center and VHF are committed to making progress in this area.



High Resolution Screen Helps Guide Device Insertion for Burn Patients

Thanks to the supporters of the Valley Health Foundation Michael Van Every Burn Fund in 2024, the Burn Center at Santa Clara Valley Medical Center and St. Louise Regional Hospital's ICU received new equipment for high-quality, patient-centered care.

In burn care, infection prevention is crucial for recovery. To assist in wound management, the Burn Center received the MolecuLight DX[™] Fluorescence Imaging Device. This handheld device accurately measures wounds and detects bacteria early, providing clinicians with detailed images and data for informed care without touching the patient.

The ICU at St. Louise Regional Hospital received a Verathon GlideScope System. This system aids in the accurate placement of breathing tubes and bronchoscopes, essential for patients needing respiratory support. Its high-resolution screen and adaptability make it a valuable tool for both adult and pediatric care, proving to be a significant asset for both staff and patients.



Highest-Ranking Rehab Hospital in the West

U.S. News & World Report recently evaluated 1,049 US rehabilitation hospitals caring for patients with strokes, brain injuries, spinal cord injuries, and burns. Santa Clara Valley Medical Center (SCVMC) was ranked #6 in the United States and was the highest-ranking rehab hospital in the Western United States. vhfca.link/USNBest

Valley Health Foundation supports the Rehabilitation program at SCVMC in a variety of ways. From purchasing exciting technology like the ZeroG° Gait and Balance System, which provides dynamic body-weight support as patients practice walking, balance tasks, sit-to-stand maneuvers, and even stairs, to supporting community events like Accessibility Day and Day on the Lake, which lets individuals with disabilities explore mobility and recreation options like adapted boating. VHF's ongoing vision is for Santa Clara County residents to have access to the highest quality health services.

Equitable Health for High-Need Communities

Response to Health Needs in the County

In 2023, VHF partnered with the Santa Clara County Public Health Department to repurpose the Covid-19 "Vax Mobile" into a general purpose mobile vaccine unit. Through generous donations, over 83,000 COVID-19 vaccinations were delivered to at-risk and hard-to-reach communities. Building on this success, the health department established the Mobile Response Team (MRT), using the van to promote health equity and accessibility by offering urgent, preventive, and educational services to high-need communities.

Multi-lingual messaging advises communities about available services in their preferred languages. In 2024, the van distributed vaccines for shigella, RSV, hep B, mpox, measles, and provided Narcan to combat fentanyl overdoses, in response to health needs in Santa Clara County. VHF donors funded a new exterior wrap for the van with messaging in English, Spanish, Vietnamese, and Chinese.



Making Healthcare Friendlier for Refugees

Accessing healthcare in the United States can be challenging for newly arrived refugees. They're navigating a new culture, language, laws, surroundings, community resources, transportation systems in addition to learning how to access healthcare in a system that is often markedly different from their country of origin.

The TB Clinic & Refugee Health Assessment Program at VHC Lundy is the only clinic of its kind in the county. It serves as the first healthcare touchpoint for new refugees, asylees, humanitarian parolees, special immigrant visa holders, and human trafficking victims. Santa Clara County has one of the highest TB rates in California and among many services offered, they provide TB screening services to new refugees, many of whom may unknowingly have this transmittable disease. Santa Clara Valley Healthcare reached out to Valley Health Foundation to help them make the clinic environment welcoming and easy to access, encouraging informed healthcare use and early detection and treatment of TB and other chronic conditions.

VHF secured a \$40,000 grant to support the immediate needs of the patient and families served by the TB and Refugee Clinic. The grant funds new and welcoming décor for family intake and pediatric exam rooms, adding interactive toys and vibrant colors to make the space more inviting. It also provides activities and snacks for children during appointments, as well as 1,000 care kits, including prenatal and infant care items, limited groceries, and short term transportation assistance.



Physicians Working to End Racism

Pedi POWER sounds like a super-hero name, but is much more!

Pedi POWER (Pediatricians Organizing and Working to End Racism) is a grassroots, SCVH physician-led movement centered on an anti-racism approach to medicine.

Pedi POWER has received several awards, including the Health Equity Transformation Award and the Perinatal Equity Conference Appreciation Award.

Pedi POWER advocates for equitable patient care, trainee education, and the recruitment and retention of pediatricians. Pedi POWER envisions a healthcare system that recognizes and corrects existing inequities through policy change, training, and through providing direct care that centers the rich diversity of its patient population.

Valley Health Foundation was an early partner in Pedi POWER's efforts in 2020 to design and provide multi-language COVID-19 vaccine educational materials because early signage endorsing vaccinations were almost entirely monolingual in English.

Today, VHF helps support Pedi POWER's Book POWER program, distributing culturally representative books and summer kits that promote a love of literacy, link children to community resources, and promote fun learning activities particularly for low-income children during the summer months.



Pedi POWER listens to its community and works to promote health equity and address racial disparities in healthcare. Through advocacy, patient education, research, and staff training, they aim to make a difference.

In 2025, they'll host their first conference, "Empowering Tomorrow," bringing together healthcare providers and community partners to create new ways to support vulnerable children and families.

Overcoming Social Effects from COVID-19

Improving Access to Childcare

Santa Clara County childcare providers faced many pandemic challenges, leading to the closure of over 600 childcare centers. Families continue to struggle to find affordable options. The County of Santa Clara, with help from Valley Health Foundation (VHF), stepped in to find solutions.

The Childcare Expansion Grant Program, was established by the County of Santa Clara utilizing \$15 million from the American Rescue Plan Act. This grant program has helped childcare providers reopen, expand, and increase the availability of affordable childcare across Santa Clara County. As one childcare provider shared, "Transforming my daycare center into a remarkable learning center has been an incredibly rewarding journey."

VHF developed and managed the application process, reviews submissions, and distributes funds, ensuring the grants focus on equity and improving access to affordable childcare. Nearly 500 applications were submitted. VHF expects to award more than 50 grants, resulting in over 600 new spaces for childcare, especially for infants and toddlers, across Santa Clara County.

The County and VHF have prioritized ongoing individual support, translation of applications, and bilingual contracts throughout the program allowing equal access to all.

Revitalize and Sustain: Supporting Nonprofits

The COVID-19 Nonprofit Resilience and Sustainability Grant Program was designed to strengthen the sustainability and responsiveness of community-based organizations in Santa Clara County. As one grant recipient shared, "With the support of this grant, our organization has been able to address systemic inequalities and support the wellness of our staff, allowing us to better care for our community."

Administered by Valley Health Foundation, this \$10 million, two-year program was funded by the County of Santa Clara through Federal Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds under the American Rescue Plan Act. **The program helped nonprofits tackle issues like lost revenue and infrastructure experienced during the pandemic by focusing on improving facilities, IT infrastructure, strategic planning, and collaboration with other nonprofits.**

A total of 87 grants were awarded to 77 nonprofit organizations serving the most vulnerable populations in Santa Clara County. Grants of up to \$150,000 were available in two categories: Resilience and Sustainability. The Resilience funds helped nonprofits recover from the economic impacts of the pandemic by replenishing inventory, strengthening IT and financial systems, and engaging in operational and/or strategic planning. The Sustainability funds focused on planning or implementing organizational changes, including strategic planning, staff training, and community outreach.



School-Based Behavioral Health Wellness Centers

Mental health is health. Making sure our children have the necessary mental health and wellness resources is critical. Santa Clara County Supervisor Susan Ellenberg said, "Even before the pandemic, we knew that levels of depression, anxiety, eating disorders, and other mental illnesses were on the rise among our youth. During the pandemic, the incidence of these illnesses skyrocketed."

Valley Health Foundation (VHF) is administering the \$13.2 million School-Based Behavioral Health Wellness Center Grant Program, designed to support Santa Clara County public school districts to open new wellness centers, supplement services at an existing wellness center, and/or strengthen and build operational infrastructure.

The School-Based Behavioral Health Wellness Center Grant Program,

is funded by the County of Santa Clara through Federal Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds under the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (ARPA), State of California Mental Health Services Act Prevention and Early Intervention funds, Juvenile Justice Crime Prevention Act funds under the Youthful Offender Block Grant, and philanthropic contributions to VHF. To date, 39 schools across 14 Santa Clara County public school districts have received School-Based Behavioral Health Wellness Center Grant Program funds. These funds have immediately impacted the mental health and well-being of thousands of students.

A leader from one participating school district said, "We are extremely excited for our Valley Health Foundation project as it has allowed us to become creative in ensuring our wellness centers are spaces that are therapeutic and welcoming offering access to all students."The grant program is part of Santa Clara County's strategic vision to address inequity and improve public health, provide safety net services for the community, and support the County's continued COVID-19 response.





The Childcare Expansion Grant Program, COVID-19 Nonprofit Resilience and Sustainability Grant Program, and the School-Based Behavioral Health and Wellness Center Grant Program are funded by the County of Santa Clara through Federal Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds under the American Rescue Plan Act.

Inspired by Fun and a Healthy Lifestyle

~ Sunny Ochoa VHF Senior Program Officer Bikes add fun to fitness, and there's nothing like a child's first bike. Turning Wheels for Kids (TWFK), a program of Valley Health Foundation, builds and distributes bikes with the goal of encouraging healthy and safe exercise for at risk, underserved and low-income families.

Since 2003, generous donors to VHF have allowed TWFK volunteers and VHF staff to build and distribute more than 50,000 age-appropriate bikes (with locks and helmets) to low-income and underserved children. These bikes are crucial for social integration, confidence-building, and cognitive well-being. VHF proudly partners with SCVH pediatric programs, including the Pediatric Healthy Lifestyle Center, community-based organizations, schools, and faith-based organizations to identify and distribute bikes to children with the greatest need.

Additionally, TWFK volunteers (including a large group of bike mechanics) and staff have hosted numerous "no cost" bike repair clinics across Santa Clara County, repairing 344 bikes for children in the past two years alone, ensuring safe and reliable transportation, and recreation for children.









Ten Vital Signs of Better Health

Valley Health Foundation and Santa Clara Valley Healthcare collaborate to address the vital signs of better health, focusing on innovative solutions and community-centered care to enhance well-being and health equity. VHF is proud of this partnership! Let's check the pulse of Santa Clara County!

Santa Clara Valley Healthcare

- Santa Clara Valley Healthcare (SCVH) serves more than
 1 in 4 area residents, offering care regardless of insurance or ability to pay.
- For more than 50 years, SCVH has provided essential training for primary and specialty care physicians. More than 25% of physicians who work in Santa Clara County received training at SCVH.
- 3. As an integrated health system, SCVH has more hospital beds than any other health system in Santa Clara County and includes a network of 16 health centers offering both primary and specialty care services.
- 4. SCVH includes three Mobile Medical Units, reaching patients that traditional clinics can't, including shelters for the unhoused, teen alternative schools and more.
- 5. The health system has a history of serving patients for nearly 150 years. SCVH's four hospitals — Santa Clara Valley Medical Center (1876), O'Connor Hospital (1889), St. Louise Regional Hospital (1989) and Regional Medical Center (joining in 2025) have a combined total of more than 300 years of providing high quality, compassionate and patient-centered care for all.

- County mortality rate for COVID-19, influenza and pneumonia are 64% lower than the national average.
- 10. Suicides in Santa Clara County are 51% lower than the national average.

Expanding Healthcare Access

Regional Medical Center

The County of Santa Clara County purchased the Regional Medical Center (RMC) in East San Jose. This acquisition will preserves critical healthcare services for the community, especially in underserved neighborhoods. By integrating RMC into the Santa Clara Valley Healthcare system, residents will have access to top-notch Level II trauma care, comprehensive stroke care, specialized heart attack treatment, and labor and delivery services.

New Inpatient Behavioral Health Facility

The County of Santa Clara is building a new inpatient psychiatric facility as part of a larger Behavioral Health Center on the Santa Clara Valley Medical Center campus in San Jose. This state-of-the-art facility will provide comprehensive mental health services for children, adolescents. and adults. Spanning 207,000 square feet, the center will feature age-appropriate amenities, indoor and outdoor therapeutic environments. and emergency psychiatric services. The goal is to offer a continuum of care in one setting, allowing young people in crisis to receive the support they need close to home. The facility is expected to be completed in 2026, addressing a critical gap in mental health services for youth in Santa Clara County and providing a safe place for healing.

Oral Health Program

A comprehensive dental network is offered through the County of Santa Clara Oral Health Program, ensuring that everyone has access to essential dental care, regardless of their financial situation. The program aims to reduce disparities in oral health by working with school districts, nonprofits, and other agencies to provide oral health services to children and underserved populations.

Palo Alto and Morgan Hill Clinic Openings

New medical clinics have opened in Palo Alto and Morgan Hill to enhance healthcare access for residents. Both clinics are part of the Santa Clara Valley Healthcare system, ensuring residents receive comprehensive and coordinated care. Services at Valley Health Center North County (Palo Alto) and Valley Health Center Morgan Hill include urgent care, family medicine, adult medicine, radiology, mammography, laboratory services, and on-site pharmacies.

New Location for Valley Health Center San Jose

Opening in 2025, this new health center location will incorporate urgent care, family medicine, specialty clinics (including the Partners in Aids Care and Education or PACE clinic), laboratory services and on-site pharmacy. Close to the Santa Clara Valley Medical Center campus on Bascom Avenue, the new location will replace clinical services provided by the current Valley Health Center San Jose and Valley Health Center Moorpark.
